Choose Hope

As I've prepared for our ongoing Sunday message series on HOPE, I found this powerful quote from G.K. Chesterton, the English writer & philosopher:

“Hope means hoping when things are hopeless, or it is no virtue at all...As long as matters are really hopeful, hope is mere flattery or platitude; it is only when everything is hopeless that hope begins to be strength.”

This is a great reminder that it is times like these (crisis and hardship) that truly gauge the amount and intensity of our hope. In other words, when everything is going smoothly, the economy is strong, our routines are steady, and we're all healthy, we can *all* claim to hold onto the hope we have in Christ. But the season we're in now –where hope is harder to come by and hopelessness is all around us – gives us an opportunity to assess our hope and ask the Lord to expand it.

There's a similar challenge in Psalm 42:5

“Why are you cast down, O my soul? And why are you disquieted within me? Hope in God, for I shall yet praise Him For the help of His countenance.”

This is something most of us can relate to but don't often discuss... the author's internal turmoil. He is in a season of despair – a time when Chesterton would say hope is strength.

Perhaps the most telling part of this verse is its authenticity. The author is in the midst of a *hope assessment* and doesn't like what he sees. He asks his own soul “why are you cast down?” and “why are you disquieted?” Like so many of the Psalms, this one is honest, even raw in representing human emotion. The

writer here is truly questioning his negativity and anxiety. Thankfully, though, he doesn't stop there. The final sentence of this verse shows the author giving *himself* the instructions to face his situation:

- 1) **Hope in God** – Not just a platitude or cliché about being hopeful, but a specific target and source of hope... God Himself. Not the government, the private sector or the medical professionals. *Hope in God.*
- 2) **Praise Him** – Hope is vital, but it may not seem like a concrete action. Praising God, on the other hand, is a clear, tangible step that each of us can take. Praise the One who saves us, provides for us, and sustains us for eternity!

So, here are my questions for you: Have you seen evidence of the hope of Jesus in your life these past weeks? As the trouble of this world increases, do you also see an increase in your hope?

If not, take to heart these same instructions. First, place your hope in God. Second, take time to praise Him no matter what. And join us on Sundays for:

- Sunday, May 3

Hope... When the System Seems Broken
