WHAT ARE YOU DOING?

I was listening to Dr. David Jeremiah last night while I was making supper and was really blessed. Let me share a few things with you that I learned. He was teaching on edification, a big word for encouraging and building one up.

1 Corinthians 10:23-24 says this, *“All things are permitted, but not all things are of benefit. All things are permitted, but not all things build people up. No one is to seek his own advantage, but rather that of his neighbor.”*

We have great freedom in Christ but our freedom is to be used wisely. To use an old saying, “sometimes we can be so near and yet so far.” We are to look out for the needs of others. Jesus has called us to make disciples. We are not just to evangelize but to teach and train who Christ is and how to live the Christian life, all of this is very personal. I am supposed to look out for the needs of others and I am to encourage you to do the same. But I am also not to neglect the other Christians I am working alongside. We are to be building each other up. As I am looking out for the needs of others, others at the same time will be looking out for me as well.

There are many things we do which aren't glamorous and many times not seen by others. Yet these things are very valuable and necessary. Those early years of parenting can be very tough, very long and extremely exhausting, yet these are some of the most important times in the lives of the children. Not only are their needs being taken care of, you are also instilling character and life skills which will make a difference throughout their life. Dr. Jeremiah also tells a story of a craftsman working on a cathedral in Europe. He was carving a bird on a beam and taking great skill. A person

watching noticed that when everything was all done it would not be seen so why was he taking such great skill. His response was he wasn't making it for the people. Our everyday tasks are not only to benefit people but we are doing it for God first and others second. We are pleasing and honoring God by our actions.

Another aspect to all of this is that we need to remember our words and actions have a ripple effect. This can either be for the good or detriment of others. Dr. Jeremiah shared this poem which says it best,

*I watched them tearing a building down,
A gang of men in a busy town,
With a ho heave ho and a lusty yell,
They swung a beam and a side wall fell
And I asked the foremen, “Are these men skilled,
The men he'd hire if he had had to build?”
He gave a laugh and said, “No indeed!
Just a common laborer is all I need.
I can easily wreck in a day or two
What builders have taken a year to do.”
I asked myself as I went my way,
Which of these roles have I tried to play.
Am I a builder who works with care,
Measuring life with rule and square?
Or am I a wrecker as I walks the town,
Content with the labor of tearing down.
